# **Kindergarten Overview**

## **Course Description**

In Kindergarten, students identify national symbols and examples of historical and current leadership. The context for investigation about families and community is reflected in the inquiry cycle: discover differences, gain insight to unique cultural characteristics, identify attributes of effective teams and leadership, and examine the use and management of natural resources, using tools to develop special understanding of their world.

## **Notes for Kindergarten**

- 1. Social Studies provide an opportunity to celebrate and explore the diversity of language, culture, ability, family structures, class, ethnicity, and gender. Every opportunity should be made to infuse the uniqueness of individuals, families, communities and regions. Critical thinking skills are inherent when exploring, describing, and comparing and contrasting people then and now
- 2. Kindergarten focuses on community with components of community to connect students to cultural diversity, job roles, natural resources and goods/services.
- 3. Students also focus on leadership (historical, current, and personal) and team participation. Part of this includes the study of national symbols and those things that groups identify with and promote as representations of their community.
- 4. Themed days like Johnny Appleseed Day are incorporated into the study of geography and the early times in America.
